SHREVEPORT SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA FOUNDER JOHN SHENAUT DIES

December 3, 2011, Shreveport, LA—It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Maestro John Shenaut, founding Music Director of the Shreveport Symphony Orchestra. He died in Shreveport on December 2, 2011.

A vigil will be held on Tuesday, December 6, 2011 from 4:00 to 4:30 p.m. at Rose Neath Funeral Home, 1815 Marshall St., Shreveport. Visitation will follow from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m.

A funeral mass will take place at 11 a.m. on Wednesday, December 7, 2011 at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, 211 Atlantic Avenue, Shreveport.

Maestro John Shenaut was the founding Music Director of the Shreveport Symphony Orchestra, conducting the first concert at Byrd High School Auditorium on November 9, 1948. He led the orchestra for an astonishing 30 years, building it from scratch into a well respected ensemble, with the help of many community partners and supporters. In addition to his skills on the podium, he displayed an uncanny knack for identifying and presenting talented young artists who would go on to major careers, including both Van Cliburn and Eugene Fodor before they won the Tchaikovsky Competition and then went on to achieve international stardom. He was a strong proponent of the educational mission of the orchestra and helped to develop the diversity of musical offerings by the orchestra that can still be seen today. He was Co-Chair of the Nena Wideman Piano competition and a talented violinist in his own right.

Shreveport Symphony Orchestra musicians, including Concertmaster Kermit Poling and Principal Oboe Theresa Zale-Bridges, will perform in tribute at the funeral on Wednesday.

Maestro Shenaut is remembered with great respect and fondness by those who knew him:

“Maestro Shenaut's impact on the cultural life of the Arklatex was deep and enduring. His work in founding, building and guiding the Shreveport Symphony Orchestra for many years touched the lives of thousands upon thousands of people, immeasurably enriching our community. I appreciated his personal warmth and encouragement, and will never forget his emotional appearance as conductor at the SSO's 60th anniversary concert in 2008. It is our hope at the Shreveport Symphony that we will continue to be worthy of the legacy he has left us.”
